God designed us for connections.

Galatians 6:2 (NIV) "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."

What is the law of Christ? To love your neighbor as yourself.

IN REAL CHRISTLIKE COMMUNITY

1. We share our food.

What are you guarding?

Acts 4:32 (NLT) "All the believers were united in heart and mind. And they felt that what they owned was not their own, so they shared everything they had."

Matthew 25:35-36 (NIV) "For I was hungry and you gave Me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave Me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited Me in. ³⁶ I needed clothes and you clothed Me, I was sick and you looked after Me, I was in prison and you came to visit Me."

Matthew 25:40 (NIV) "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of Mine, you did for Me."

2. We show our flaws.

Romans 15:7 (NIV) "Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God."

We might impress people with our strengths, but we connect with people through our weaknesses.

Proverbs 28:13 (NIV) "Whoever conceals their sins does not prosper, but the one who confesses and renounces them finds mercy."

Life and freedom are waiting for you on the other side of vulnerability.

3. We fight together.

John 10:10 (NIV) "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."

1 Peter 5:8-9 (NIV) "Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. 9 Resist him, standing firm in the faith, because you know that the family of believers throughout the world is undergoing the same kind of sufferings."

Resist, in the Greek, means to fight against.

We don't fight for victory. We fight from victory.

We have a Savior who sees us, who fights for us, and who loves us

We carry one another's burdens, but we also allow someone else to help carry our burden as well.

God did not create you to do life alone.

It's time to take a step of faith into real community.

The first-century believers desperately needed each other, and they knew it.
